# YOU KNOW WHAT 'NORMAL' LOOKS LIKE.

# Customs brokers can play an integral role in helping us identify and stop cross border crime, particularly drug smuggling.

You see import documents, create entries, and interact with clients. You know what 'normal' looks like and you can identify when a shipment or situation is suspicious.

## Look out for:

- NZ identity for a client code is sent from an overseas client
- Documents may appear false or crudely created
- Inability or reluctance to provide all documents in a timely manner or paperwork is incomplete
- The method of import doesn't match the type of goods e.g. low value goods being shipped using high cost freight streams
- The weight of the goods doesn't match the value or description
- All communication for an import by a NZ company is made through someone based offshore, where the client is not previously known and trusted
- The type of goods don't match the importer (e.g. golf carts going to a furniture shop)
- The method or process of payment for any fees appears unusual or suspicious

- The 'importer' is unsure and does not appear to have a good understanding of processes, the nature of their import, and cannot answer standard questions easily
- Email addresses that don't match the importer or supplier e.g. the company name doesn't feature within the email address
- The importer doesn't seem to properly exist or has a very limited footprint e.g. the business has a name but the address/delivery details don't relate, no information on the Internet, no associated email/ postal addresses

Your information could help us stop criminal activity that adversely affects all New Zealanders.
